One friend in his seventies regretted the sudden absence of glances and smiles from the opposite sex. Another friend in her eighties said store clerks tend to respond immediately to "perky little things" while ignoring her efforts to ask a question.

I also overheard two teacher's aides talking about their own outfits during a Wacky Wednesday at their school. "I would be embarrassed to go out in something like this," one said, looking at her patterned tights and checkered top. "Oh, said the other, "just tell people you're old. Then they won't care."

One would think that living in a retirement community would guard us against these prejudices. But no. I was taking pictures of a group of women on a recent trip when one urged me to hurry up before the "old" ladies approached.

It's no wonder that people equate getting older with negative stereotypes. The media bombards us with bumbling, helpless, cranky ... even child-like older characters. We hear television announcers say someone is 100 years *young* as if even the word *old* is somehow pejorative.

Researchers at the Annenberg School for Communication and Journalism determined that almost half of researched television programs featuring older Americans include demeaning language from younger characters and self-deprecating comments by older characters, including wisecracks about wrinkled skin and failing memories.

I think it's time we reject this messaging, embrace getting older and appreciate our fabulousness. With retirement we have more time for loved ones. We have an opportunity to pursue long postponed dreams. We can sleep late, dine or play with our friends during the day ... and take advantage of senior discounts.

What's not to love?

TALK OF THE TOWN



Pay Your Rent Online or By Phone



You no longer have to walk or drive down to the office, or even find a stamp or two to pay your rent, water and service bills.

Recently the McKee Group partnered with RentPayment, an online payment service company to broaden the ways residents can make their payments. Through the company, residents can make payments online using debit/credit cards for a small fee, or e-checks for no cost. The program also allows residents to make payments by phone or by using an app they can download on their cell phone. In addition, the program offers a recurring payment option.

Village of Buckingham Springs Property Manager Amy Grzywinski said that partnering with RentPayment expands the options residents have to pay their bills. “People have been asking for this and we’re happy to provide it,” said Ms. Grzywinski. She said payments are credited to residents’ accounts within a day or two. Printed directions are in the clubhouse.

To sign up, residents go online to rentpayment.com. To read detailed instructions for registering, click on “Learn More.” To register, click on “Sign Up Now.” You will be told to enter the property name, Village of Buckingham Springs. The community name will pop up. Press select. You’ll be taken to a page with three steps. Click on “Set up Account.” You’ll be asked to fill in your name. You must use the name **as it appears on your water bill**. That’s the name provided to Rentpayment by the McKee Group.

Under Property Name, write in Village of Buckingham Springs. Under Property Street, write Durham Road. Complete the address with New Hope, select Pennsylvania on the drop-down menu and fill out 18938 for the zip code. You’ll be taken to a new page, where you’ll be asked to select your property from a list down the left-hand side of the page. Choose Village of Buckingham Springs.

The next page says “Set Up Your Account.” Choose your street from the drop-down menu. Press continue. The next page will have your name in the correct boxes. Under Select Your Address, find the number of your house in the drop-down menu. Then, create your login and password. If you have a cell phone, fill in the number. Under the number you’ll be asked if you want SMS (text) messages to remind you when rent is due. A second box is already marked. If you keep it marked, you will also receive news from Rentpayment. If you don’t want to receive these notifications, click on the box to unmark it. Finally, you must check the third box indicating you accept the terms of use.

If you want to make a payment, continue to “Make a Payment.” On that page enter your credit/debit card numbers or create a free e-check account by entering your bank routing number and checking account number. A diagram on the page shows you where you’ll find each number on your checks. At that time you can also choose to use autopay, which means the rent payment will be automatically taken out of your checking or savings account on a specific day of each month.

If you are having problems setting up your account, Rentpayment provides assistance. You can call customer service at 866-289-5977, or send questions via e-mail to customerservice@rentpayment.com.

You are now able to make your rent, water, and service payments online. Go to Rentpayment.com, click on the "New to RentPayment?" blue link, then click on the "Sign up Now" button. You can set up recurring payments that will automatically be sent each month....one less thing to worry about! Look for the article on Page 3 of this month's newsletter that gives you more detailed instructions. There is also additional literature and instructions in the sales office.

Enclosed in this newsletter you will find some updated information from Waste Management regarding recycling in The Village. Please look for the insert in this newsletter edition.

Recently, many homes in the community experienced a power outage. When your power goes out, do not call the management office. There is nothing we can do to help you. If the office is also experiencing a power outage, our phones will not ring. During a power outage you should call PECO to report the outage as soon as possible. Fahrenheit 451

By Ray Bradbury

Back to the future with this 1953 novel that most of us read in high school.

It is considered one of the major novels of the 20th Century and won numerous literary awards as well as a Grammy nomination for the e-book version – read by the author himself.

The group's overall rating for this classic science fiction story was a six, with opinions ranging from an “awful” - two to a “really liked” - 10. The storyline is set in the future when books -- forbidden by a totalitarian regime -- are burned. The main character, Guy Montag was a fireman whose job it was to start fires. The system was simple and everyone understood it -- books were for burning ... along with the houses in which they were hidden.

Guy Montag enjoyed his job and never questioned the midnight runs with a hose full of accelerant nor watching pages consumed by flames ... until he met a 17-year-old girl who told him of a past when people were not afraid. Then he met a professor who told him of a future in which people could think, and Guy Montag set his life on a different path.

Donna Hilton reported that in an interview with Bradbury for the National Endowment for the Art's, the author acknowledged that his inspiration for this

novel was Hitler who burned books in the streets of Berlin.

The members agreed that the book was thought provoking and even more relevant today than it was in the 1950's. Despite its dark tone, it held many comparisons to today's societal ills, e.g., the decline of print materials, social media replacing human interactions, and an over-abundance of TV viewing.

Diana Rickards loved the story despite its “Picasso-like” style of storytelling. She, along with many other readers, admired the author's great vision in 1953 to write about ear buds and portable televisions.

Similarly, **Jane Ann Trimarchi** appreciated the author's imagination to include touch-command doors, robotic dogs and a dedicated team of medical technicians who treated a full nightly roster of accidental -- or maybe purposeful -- overdose poisonings.

Wilma Wydro enjoyed the ending -- especially when Guy Montag found liberation from his job, his wife and his old mindset and met a tribe of like-minded individuals determined to keep books alive by memorizing them.

Gail Markfelsing enjoyed the current HBO-movie version better than the book and shared that the original 1950's version of the movie was good for a laugh!

The author, Ray Bradbury, was born in 1920 and died in 2012. His more than 500 published works, including *The Martian Chronicles*, *The Illustrated Man*, and *Something Wicked This Way Comes* are timeless masterworks.

News of The World

The book club spent some cold January days enjoying another great read – members gave this novel an overall rating of 8.3. The historical fiction incorporated post-Civil war history, a great storyline and interesting characters.

The timeframe is 1870 and Captain Jefferson Kyle Kidd travels through northern Texas, giving live newspaper readings to paying audiences hungry for news of the world. An elderly widower, who has lived through three wars and fought in two of them, enjoys his rootless, solitary existence.

Summary: (*from Goodreads*) *In Wichita Falls, [Kidd] is offered a \$50 gold piece to deliver a young orphan [Johanna] to her relatives in San Antonio. Four years earlier, a band of Kiowa raiders killed Johanna's parents and sister. Sparing the little girl, they raised her as one of their own. Recently rescued by the U.S. Army, the ten-year-old has once again been torn away from the only home she knows.*

Their 400-mile journey south through unsettled territory and unforgiving terrain proves difficult and at times dangerous. Johanna has forgotten the English language, tries to escape at every opportunity, and refuses to act "civilized." Yet as the miles pass, the two lonely survivors tentatively begin to trust each other, forging a bond that marks the difference between life and death in this treacherous land.

Arriving in San Antonio, the reunion is neither happy nor welcome. The captain must hand Johanna over to an aunt and uncle she does not remember—strangers who regard her as an unwanted burden. A respectable man, Captain Kidd is faced with a terrible choice: Abandon the girl to her fate or become—in the eyes of the law—a kidnapper himself."

Diana Rickards, who chose this great selection for us to read, gave the book a "12," and shared that she loved how the lead character – a man of 72 – was still working and making contributions to society. **Maryann Vagas** agreed that Captain Kidd was a "wonderful character." Most everyone in the group agreed that they never heard of "news reader" as an occupation, but realized that it made perfect sense since news was not easy to come by on the prairies and many folks at that time were illiterate.

I was not sure that a cowboy and Indian-theme would appeal to me. But watching the paternal relationship develop between "Cap-Tin" and his young charge, Johanna, was thoroughly enjoyable ... and the author's descriptive style of their journey and rugged lifestyle was fascinating.

Donna Hilton gave it a "10" citing a complex plot and great character development.

Judy Quattrone learned a lot and enjoyed the book's ending. **Gail Markfelding** said that the book was probably written on a 5th grade level, providing for an easy read.

I won't give the ending away, but it made **Cindy Taylor** cry!

We are including tips for residents in each of our newsletter articles. Our newest electronics tip follows:

Remember your passwords!

- Passwords MUST be used to protect your electronic devices
- Passwords should not be real words, names or public information associated with you (e.g. Social Security Numbers, family names, pet names, birthdays, phone numbers, addresses, etc.)
- Do not use obvious passwords (e.g. 1111111, 123456789, iloveyou, etc.)
- The components of a good password include ALL of the following: both upper and lower case letters, numbers, special characters (the symbols above the numbers on your keyboard), be 8-12 characters long and not easily decipherable at first glance
- Record your passwords in a booklet, do not use scraps of paper or sticky notes and be sure to differentiate between a number '0' and a letter 'O' and a number '1' and a letter 'l'
- The same password should NOT be used for all your sites.

VILLAGE OF BUCKINGHAM SPRINGS HOMEOWNERS' ASSOCIATION MINUTES: March 4, 2019

President, Bob Blum called the meeting to order at 7 p.m. Trustee Mike Hennelly led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PRESENTATION BY BUCKINGHAM POLICE DEPARTMENT/ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE:

Detective Corporal John T. Bailey from the Buckingham Police Department brought a prescription drop off box for residents use at the meeting along with a variety of literature regarding senior services. He and his partner, Detective Logan, are available for any resident questions and/or concerns. The non-emergency dispatch number for Buckingham Police Department is 215-794-8811. He introduced David Shallcross, Director of Senior Protection Unit, from the Attorney General's office.

Mr. Shallcross advised the group that his office is available Monday through Friday, 7 a.m. to 7 p.m. at the Senior Help Line phone number (866-623-2137.) In honor of National Consumer Protection Week, Shallcross provided the following fraud detection tips:

- Check gas pumps for skimmers by checking for false fronts – tug or twist prior to use.
- Use credit cards at gas stations rather than debit since debit charges immediately come out of your account, while you have 30 days to flag credit card charges.
- Use newer gas stations since they have the best security and technology and use a gas pump that is closest to cashier windows and in a well-lit area.
- It is a bad idea to give your credit card to a server at a restaurant – they could be concealing a pocket-sized skimmer.
- Chip readers were to have been in place at all retailers by October 2015; December 2017 for gas stations. If a retailer is not chip accessible, they are responsible for fraudulent activity at their store.
- EMV (European MasterCard/Visa) chip technology is the current best practice; but information can still be stolen through the use of thin skimmers
- Put Tap or Wave cards into an RFID sleeve (radio frequency) -- similar to EZ Pass technology
- New passports also now use chip technology and should be enclosed in an RFID sleeve.
- Remove labels from medicine bottles; your caller ID may look like a drug store name calling you about a prescription, but it could be someone “Spoofing” the call; do not trust caller ID
- Never give out credit card info to callers; only provide 3 digit security code for online and phone purchases
- If the caller warns you of problems on your credit card, call your card's customer service to confirm if there is really a problem.
- Be wary of “too good to be true” online offers. It could be “Click bait” to get you to download a virus to steal information from your computer.




Spotlight On: Tom and Pat Eagle

Pat Williams was ready to quit. She'd been on the online dating service for six months and her subscription was expiring that day. She'd met no one electrifying. Well, she decided, if this was God's plan for her life, she knew she could make it on her own.

Then a profile popped up. The man liked bowling, dancing and origami, interests shared by **Pat**. And his thoughts about relationships grabbed her. "I'm looking for someone who is kind with a positive outlook on life. I believe relationships are two-way streets, where caring and giving go both ways."

Tom Eagle's words stirred her interest. But again, it was her last day online. She stepped out of the recommended confines of online dating and sent **Tom** her personal e-mail address, saying he could use it if interested. He was. **Pat**'s profile described a woman he believed could be a life partner. They emailed, and then set up a telephone date.

Pat stood him up.


"But later, when she told me why, I understood," **Tom** says. A widowed friend of **Pat**'s was in crisis and Pat forgot about the call. They laugh about it now. "She called me about one in the morning, explained and apologized. The next day they went on their first date; bowling and lunch.

"In three hours I knew she was the one," **Tom** says now. "We had so much in common." "I told him things I'd never told anyone," adds **Pat**. I felt so open with him."

Individually, **Pat** and **Tom** are kind, gracious and loving. Together they're formidable. When they met, they lived 90 miles apart. They took turns traveling between their homes. Ten months into their relationship, **Tom** learned his company was planning to outsource its human relations department and fire all its employees, including **Tom**.

No worries, they agreed, he would retire instead, sell his home in Mount Laurel, in South Jersey, live with **Pat** in Port Murray, in North Jersey and look for another job there. He quickly landed one as a web designer at a bank across the river in Bethlehem, PA.

Then there was serendipity. One day **Tom** told **Pat** he had to go to the hospital because his back hurt him so much he could hardly walk. X-rays showed that **Tom** had cancer. Multiple Myeloma causes cancer cells to accumulate in the bone marrow, where they crowd out healthy blood cells. Both the disease and the treatment affect the body's ability to fight off infections. And often it goes undetected

until treatment is futile.

This is where the formidable comes in. **Pat**, a legal assistant in Johnson & Johnson's consumer division's law department, immediately got on the phone. She learned that **Tom**'s best bet was the Hunterdon Regional Cancer Center in Flemington NJ. She connected with one of the top doctor's in the area and within two days, **Tom** was his patient.

"**Pat** and I never gave up," Tom said. "Once we found out I had a problem, she took control. She learned everything she could about my cancer." They also agreed on other life-changing decisions. Tom would go on disability. Pat would transfer to J&J's Skillman location, closer to Flemington. Later they would decide to sell Pat's mountain-top home and move to a 55+ community. They found Buckingham Springs.

There's no cure for Multiple Myeloma. **Tom** will continue having chemo treatments monthly for the rest of his life. He will always have reduced ability to fight off infections. But both he and **Pat** feel blessed. Blessed that they found each other, blessed that they can manage Tom's health, blessed that they have been able to find close friends in their new community, blessed by their family.

"Tom didn't have an easy childhood," **Pat** says. "Yet he has no animosity, he sees the glass as half-full. It easily could have been another way." When **Tom** was two years old his father left the family. His mother couldn't take care of him, his twin brother and their two sisters. Tom was brought up in a private school, separated from his siblings, although they have all remained close.

Tom's family now includes Pat's two daughters, Nicole, 33 and Paige, 30. "They made everything easy for me," **Tom** says. "They are so accepting. We hit it off right away." In fact, they call **Tom** TT – **Tom** Terrific.

Not long after they moved into Buckingham Springs, **Tom** joined the bowling team and attended a computer club meeting. There he learned they needed someone to continue the work **Bob Phillips** had done setting up a community website. **Tom** took it over. "The website is a godsend for me because it keeps me busy," **Tom** says.

And Pat quickly joined the social committee and has planned several events, including country-line dancing and DJ Jenny (with **Kathy Conti**). She and **Kathy** are also planning this year's Luau.

Pat's looking forward to retiring at the end of the month. She'll join the bowling league, sign up at a local gym with **Tom**, travel and enjoy life with friends and family.

Not long ago, **Pat** decided to get a custom license plate that reflects her life. It was an easy choice. It says "*BLESSED*."
