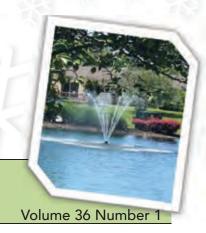

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:

The Blizzard of 1996

according to the National Weather Service blizzards are storms with high-intensity winds greater than 35 mph (56 kph), and visibility of less than ½ mile (0.4 km) for a minimum of three hours. Blizzard conditions often build up on the northwest side of a powerful storm system because of a difference in pressure between the low pressure of the storm and the high pressure beyond the storm. Conditions during a blizzard can be severe and life-threatening. The significant elements for the creation of a blizzard are cold air (below freezing) to make snow, moisture to form clouds and precipitation, and rising moist air to rise over very cold air, which results in clouds and snow.

The Blizzard of '96 was an incredible meteorological event of one of the more magnificent winters ever, a storm that still stands out in memory to this date and is considered one of the epic storms of all time. The storm formed in the Gulf of Mexico on the morning of January 6th. It reached the Georgia Coast by the morning of the 7th then moved northeast toward Cape Hatteras, North Carolina by the evening of the 7th before reaching the waters off of Southern New England the evening of the 8th. The heavy snowfall was largely due to a combination of sufficient moisture aided by cold air pushed south from an Arctic high pressure located north of the storm that generated highly effective liquid precipitation to snow ratios and a highly favorable storm track. Significant and in many cases record-breaking snow for either 24 hours or a single snowstorm occurred with this event from the Ohio Valley to southwestern Virginia to the Washington, D.C. to southern New England urban corridor. Philadelphia was shattered with an unprecedented 30.7 inches of snow and became part of one of the most extreme weather events in the nation's history. All day Sunday, Jan. 7, 1996, it was as though the entire Philadelphia region had vanished beneath shrouds of snow crystals frenzied by blinding blizzard winds. By the time the snow shut off on Monday afternoon, Jan. 8, 1996, the region was crippled and stunned. More than 30 emergency vehicles, including 15 firetrucks, were stranded in the streets. Highways were closed on both sides of the river. For the storm's shutdown powers,

As we now know, a blizzard means that the following conditions are expected to prevail for 3 hours or longer, sustained wind or frequent gusts to 35 miles an hour or greater and considerable falling and blowing snow. This event failed to have the wind reach the criteria long enough in most areas. But, given the Blizzard Warnings issued for the event, the common usage of the name "Blizzard of '96" before, during, and after the event has stuck since, even in the meteorological community despite it not being technically

correct in most locations. In today's National Weather Service, issuing Blizzard Warnings based on the impact of the snow rather than the meteorology would be seen as an example of impact-based forecasting and warnings versus the old legacy of strictly criteriabased issuance as was often common in the 1990s. Snow flurries even fell as far south from this system as Florida, stretching from Tallahassee to just north of Tampa in New Port Richey sending a touch of winter to a place many go to escape it. But with the bigger snows the storm was noted to fall much further north, reaching as much as 48 inches in Snowshoe, West Virginia. In the most severely impacted areas, transportation was crippled for days, municipalities struggled to clear the snow and find places to put it, mail service was briefly halted from Atlantic City, NJ to Albany, NY, numerous roofs caved in from the weight of the snow damaging structures, schools and businesses closed for days, and newspaper delivery along with other supply delivery was halted. Many people were stuck at roadside rest stops. Along the coast, flooding occurred, and the onshore flow resulted in the bizarre site at Atlantic City, NJ of hundreds of clam shells washing ashore into mounds on the beach. The snowpack in many areas reached over 2 feet and, with additional snows and cold following the storm, laid on the ground until a warm-up later in January with heavy rainfall that took place and resulted in major river flooding.

The 30.7 inches of reported snowfall at the official observation station at Philadelphia International Airport, turned out to be quite controversial, requiring a recount, a federal investigation, and a verdict that took four years to render. The skepticism wasn't founded solely on utter improbability. The snow wasn't measured: The total was estimated with a formula using the melted-liquid content of the snow with the air temperature, which was in the teens and 20s while the snow was falling. The new automated observing system, which the weather service had installed in stations around the country, could do just about everything but measure snow.

The government commissioned the then Franklin Institute meteorologists and a Rutgers University professor, to vet the total. They concluded that since similar totals were reported nearby, including 33 inches in Cherry Hill, the evidence was insufficient to overturn the 30.7 figure, and it still stands. The recent mega-snow-storms could be evidence supporting the hypothesis that a warming world would mean wetter storms; warmer air can hold more water. "Stay safe this winter and be prepared for another incredible snow-storm of the century!"

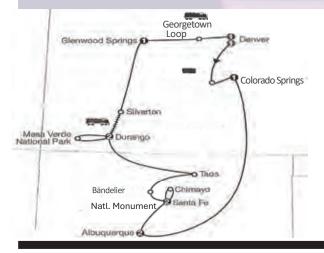

Nurturing Emotional Intelligence (EQ)

Psychologists, Peter Salovey and John D. Mayer in the 1990s coined the term "emotional intelligence" (EQ). Defined as "the subset of social intelligence that involves the ability to monitor one's own and others' feelings and emotions, to discriminate among them, and to use this information to guide one's thinking and actions" it quickly became a concept of importance in education, business, and popular culture. It served as the missing link to explain an unexpected finding: 70% of the time, people with average IQ (cognitive intelligence) outperform those with the highest IQ. This was puzzling because IQ was considered a strong predictive measure of performance and for many, was assumed to be the sole source of success. We now know that IQ accounts for only about 25% of the success in one's career. Emotional intelligence is the critical differentiator. People who are successful at work aren't just smart, they have high EQ. High EQ is essential for those working in emotion-

ally demanding healthcare occupations. At first glance, the connection between EQ and well-being may not seem readily apparent; however, research indicates otherwise. Studies have shown that higher EQ leads to lower levels of stress, higher rates

of positive emotional states and happiness, and better health and well-being. The literature has also determined EQ is associated with healthier coping skills, suggesting that growing EQ may improve coping with stress. EQ is an array of competencies that fall within 4 domains. The first 2 domains, self-awareness and self-management, have to do with our ability to relate to ourselves, reflecting "personal competence." The other 2 domains, social awareness, and relationship management, have to do with our ability to relate to others, reflecting "social competence." Nested within the 4 domains are 12 EQ competencies: emotional self- awareness, emotional selfcontrol, adaptability, achievement orientation, positive outlook, empathy, organizational awareness, influence, coaching and mentoring, conflict management, teamwork, and inspirational leadership.

Motivation

Although we cannot "see" EQ, we can see how it (and the lack of it) manifests in people's behaviors. Reflect on your behavior and the people around you. People with low EQ get stressed easily; they're twice as likely to experience anxiety, depression, substance abuse, and even thoughts of suicide. They have a limited emotional vocabulary, and thus don't know how to accurately identify, and appropriately address, how they're feeling. They

mask their negative emotions with positivity that isn't genuine or productive rather than express what they're truly feeling. They often feel misunderstood because they don't clearly deliver their message. They lack effective communication skills. They blame other people for how they're feeling rather than taking responsibility for their own emotions. They have difficulty asserting themselves, and when feel or interpret being crossed, default to passive or aggressive outrageous behavior. They make assumptions quickly and defend them vehemently, even with evidence to the contrary. They hold grudges, and in this way, prevent reconciliation. They don't let go of their mistakes and thus are unable to adapt and adjust for future success. They don't know their triggers, the situations, and people that "push their buttons" and cause them to act impulsively. And they're easily offended since they lack self-confidence. All of these behaviors are the hallmarks of low EQ.

In contrast, people with high EQ respond to people and situations instead of reacting to them. They're aware of their feelings, and of why they are feeling as they do, and can manage their emotions better than most. They sense the feelings of the people they in-

teract with and understand others' way of seeing things. They often have a higher level of empathy. They're able to cut through the drama and stick to the facts. They can guide a tough conversation to a satisfactory agreement and help settle conflicts. They take in the whole view of the problem and look at all sides of the issue. They keep their focus on the main goals and know the steps it takes to get there. They're naturally optimistic and can recover quickly when they get upset. They're aware of their limitations as well as their strengths. All of these behaviors are the hallmarks of high EQ. Higher EQ means improved stress management, interpersonal functioning, leadership abilities, and job satisfaction. Emotional intelligence affects nearly everything we say and do, and in this way, influences nearly every outcome. Its intangible nature makes it difficult to know how emotionally intelligent any one of us may be. If you're wondering where you stand on the scale of low to high EQ, there are a variety of tools to measure it online, such as in Psychology Today.

Cultivating EQ offers a pathway to counter negative mental and physical health outcomes across various domains of life. EQ empowers us to navigate challenges with resilience, self-awareness, and constructive commu-



nication. Developing EQ is within reach for those willing to invest the time and effort. By actively working to understand and manage emotions, improve interpersonal relationships, and build emotional resilience, individuals can enhance their overall well-being and lead more balanced lives. Engaging in activities such as seeking social support, practicing stress management techniques, and participating in EQ-based coaching can further bolster EQ and positively influence mental and physical health.

Emotional intelligence (EQ) is a key factor in wellness. Here are some strategies to improve your emotional intelligence (EQ) and overall wellness:

- **Practice mindfulness:** Tune into your thoughts and emotions to recognize stressors and triggers. My article **Mindfulness, the Path to Wellness** can be found in the June-July 2024 Newsletter.
- Develop emotional regulation techniques: Use strategies like deep breathing, meditation, or seeking professional help.
- Cultivate empathy: Listen actively and try to understand others' perspectives.
- **Strengthen social bonds:** Build and maintain meaningful relationships with friends, family, and colleagues.

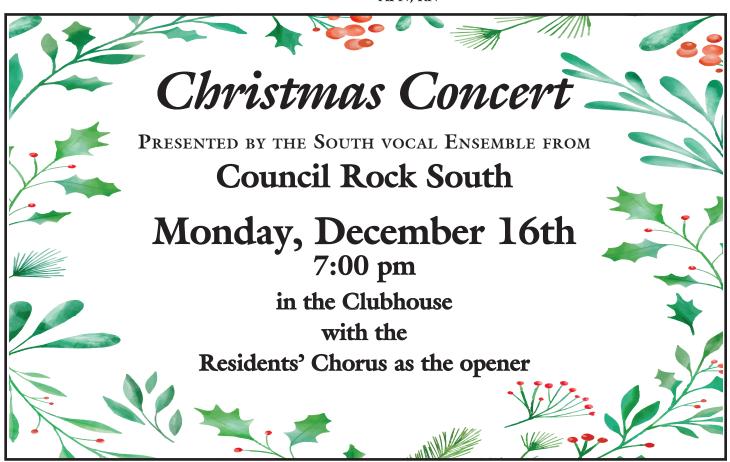
- **Continual learning:** Attend workshops, read books, or listen to podcasts to develop your EQ.
- **Prioritize your emotions:** Recognize your emotions and make decisions that prioritize your mental health.
- **Find ways to relieve stress:** Try practicing self-care, going for a walk, or meditating.
- **Use your senses:** Try viewing a favorite photo, smelling a specific scent, or listening to a piece of music.
- Exercise: Try to include some sort of flowing movement every day.
- **Get quality sleep:** Go to bed and wake up at the same time each day, and sleep in a dark, quiet, comfortable environment.

EQ involves self-awareness, social awareness, self-management, and relationship management. Nurturing Emotional Intelligence is the Cornerstone of Mental and Physical Well-Being
