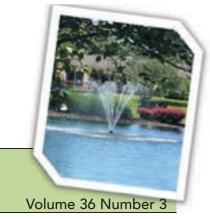

LETTER FROM THE EDITOR:

It's Barbecue Season

Grilling on a gas grill can be quick and convenient, but to get the best results, a few tips can make a big difference! Here are some essential barbecue tips for gas grills:

1. Preheat the Grill

- Why? Preheating helps to prevent food from sticking and ensures even cooking.
- **How?** Turn on your gas grill, close the lid, and preheat for about 10-15 minutes before

cooking.

2. Clean Your Grill Regularly

- Why? Grease buildup can cause flare-ups and affect the taste of your food.
- How? Use a grill brush to clean the grates after each use while the grill is still warm. Also, clean the grease tray often.

3. Create Two-Zone Heat

- Why? Direct heat is perfect for searing, while indirect heat is great for cooking through without burning.
- How? Set one side of the grill to high heat and the other to low (or turn off one burner entirely), so you have both direct and indirect heat zones.

4. Use the Right Tools

- Why? Proper tools make grilling easier and safer.
- How? Invest in long tongs, a spatula, and a meat thermometer. This helps you avoid burning yourself and ensures that food is cooked to perfection.

5. Don't Overcrowd the Grill

- Why? Placing too much food on the grill can cause uneven cooking and prevent proper airflow.
- How? Make sure there's enough space between the items you're grilling so that heat circulates evenly around the food.

6. Keep the Lid Closed

- Why? The lid helps maintain a consistent temperature and prevents heat from escaping.
- How? Keep the lid closed as much as possible, especially when cooking thick cuts of meat or larger items.

7. Use a Meat Thermometer

• Why? A thermometer ensures your meat is cooked to

the correct internal temperature, preventing overcooking or undercooking.

 How? Insert the thermometer into the thickest part of the meat (away from bone) to check for doneness.

8. Let Meat Rest Before Serving

- Why? Resting allows juices to redistribute, making your meat more tender and flavorful.
- How? Once your food is off the grill, cover it loosely with foil and let it rest for 5-10 minutes.

9. Experiment with Flavor

- **Why?** Gas grills can sometimes lack the smoky flavor that charcoal grills provide.
- How? Use wood chips or chunks in a smoker box or wrap them in foil to add extra flavor. You can also try marinades, rubs, and sauces for a flavor boost.

10. Be Patient and Don't Press on the Meat

- Why? Pressing down on meat with a spatula may seem like a good way to make it cook faster, but it actually squeezes out valuable juices.
- **How?** Let your meat cook without pressing down on it, and avoid constantly flipping it.

With these tips, you'll be grilling like a pro on your gas grill. Enjoy your barbecue!

Thope this month's Newsletter finds you well and enjoying the warmer weather! Please see a couple of trash and recycling reminders below:

- Trash and recycle pick-up times may vary, so to ensure yours is collected, it is best to put it out after 7:00 pm on Monday evenings, or before 7:00 am Tuesday mornings. Please make sure it is in secure containers.
- No plastic bags are permitted in recycling; this is considered contamination. Recycle material should be placed loosely in your recycling container. Your recycling container must be clearly labeled. Stickers are available online or in your local Home Depot, Lowes, or hardware stores.

Last year we conducted a Community-wide inspection of all homes to help identify items that require maintenance. The program was a great success and helped keep the Village beautiful and property values high. This is a great time of year to plan your outdoor chores and home improvement projects. Enclosed in this newsletter is a list of home standard requirements that we routinely check. Let's keep the momentum going to ensure our neighborhood continues to be beautiful and welcoming!

Pool season is right around the corner! The pool opens on Saturday, May 24th. Pool hours are Monday, Wednesday, and Friday 12:00 – 8:00pm; Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday, and Sunday 11:00am – 7:00pm. Residents must show their Village ID card to gain access to the pool.

Enclosed in this newsletter is an insert with instructions for purchasing pool passes. We will use the same request form as last year and passes will be mailed to your home address. As a reminder, pool passes do not expire so you may use left over passes from last year for the upcoming season. Also, the lifeguard does not sell pool passes. Trash and recycling service will be pushed back one day due to the Memorial Day holiday. Trash and recycling will be picked up Wednesday, May 28th.

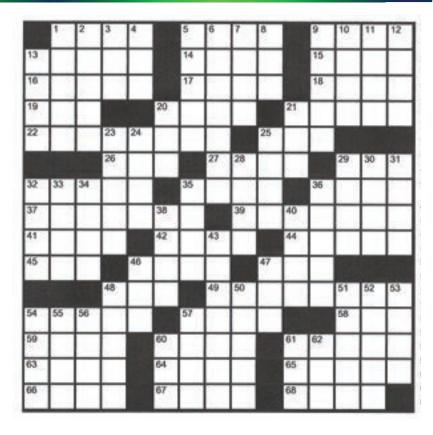
The office will be closed on Friday April 18th starting at noon for Good Friday and on May 26th for Memorial Day. Sincerely,

THE GARDEN CLUB



The Garden Club resumed on Tuesday, March 11, with 19 in attendance, including some new residents. We went around the room for introductions and brief comments about updates on past projects. As we went around the room, several questions came up and further along in the meeting we tried to answer those questions - such as . . . someone needs a new pruner and the brand Felco was recommended; someone is looking to plant a deer-resistant cutting garden and the plants Rubecia, Giant Zinnia, tall Marigolds and Lavender were recommended. Also, American Meadows, online, has many seed packet options available for Zone 7 - you can also purchase whole gardens!!! Check it out. Louise's Birds Nest Spruce which she planted about 8 years ago, died over the winter and she wondered about suggestions as to what might have happened and/or was it suitable for where it was planted.

OF NOTE: Bowman's Hill Native Plant Nursery Opening weekend, for the Public is April 5 and 6. DelVal Aday, it's 75th year, April 25 to 27th. Penn State Extension Plant Sale should be held on May 3.

You should wait to clean up your garden until the temperature overnight is around 50 degrees for several nights, so as not to disturb the pollinators.

Jim brought to the meeting one of his orchids, which was absolutely beautiful with yellow flowers. He fertilizes it with African violet fertilizer - 1/2 teaspoon to a gallon of water, just a bit when he waters it weekly. Jim also gave us seeds for a Date Palm and someone brought seed starters that were donated.

We mentioned that classes are available at the Morris Arboretum for a fee and also Penn State Extension has online classes available.

Debbie told us that this area is now considered Zone 7A, we were formerly Zone 6, which means we are getting warmer.

We discussed good places to purchase plants and Produce Junction in Hatboro and a place in NJ, Gasco were mentioned. Several handouts were available.

Suggestions for future meetings include - MaryAnn, one of our members is a Horticulture Therapist and she will be happy to talk about her work; Louise's daughter-in-law has a flower shop in Peddler's Village and we will invite her to our May meeting. Everyone loved the Garden Tours we did in VBS, so hopefully we will be able to do one or two of those this year.

Our next meeting will be Tuesday, April 8, at 7 pm, in the Clubhouse Card Room. All are welcome.
